#### Southern Cal Chapter Holds a Special Judged Meet June 21<sup>st</sup>, 2025

To help a long time NCRS member, supporter, and host, the Southern California Chapter called on



hide the fact that this engine was a race worthy engine, it was advertised as 430 horsepower for \$1,032.15. At that same time there was another engine choice called the L-71 that advertised 435 horsepower and was only \$437.10. While the L-88 did make the Chevrolet advertised 430 hp, it wasn't the actual peak horsepower that engine made. The actual horsepower was closer to 565hp. The L-88 option stopped the purchaser from selecting a radio as well. These little tricks were enough to keep most people from ordering this L-88 option. As such only 116 folks checked

In case you aren't familiar, the L-88 engine was a factory racing engine available at a time when the factory did not publicly support racing programs. To

for the judging on Saturday, June 21st for the eager judges and spectators. After the judges had gone over this rare Corvette with a fine-tooth comb, and the tabulators double checked the judge's work, Mike Vietro had achieved a Top Flight Award and met the requirement to register this Corvette for the Las Vegas NCRS National Meet. 
## 1963-67 Door Hinge Rebuilding NCRS# 33467 Ron Bartow TECH ARTICLE

If you have tried adjusting your doors, only to find it hasn't helped them close as smoothly as you had hoped, you may find the culprit is a sloppy hinge. All the skills in the world won't help adjust your door if the hinge has an up and down movement. Hinges mustn't move up and down, only swing in and out.

If all your bolts holding the hinge to the door, and the bolts holding the hinge to the jamb are tight, you shouldn't be able to lift on the back edge of your door and feel it moving (or clunking) up and down. If it does, the culprit is the hinge itself.


Removing a hinge involves taking out 10 bolts for each hinge, and more than that to dig down to the hinges. Your shop manual will help guide this step.

To restore the smooth and solid hinge operation, there are only a few straight forward steps to take. Here are those steps, presented with photos to simplify your project.




original pins if you wish to keep the original headmark. You won't be able to read or see those headmarks when the hinge is installed in the hinge pocket of your Corvette.





Once you knock the pin out of the hinge, you will either use the pin in the rebuild kit, or this original. If you wish to use the original, we need to clean it up a little so it moves smoothly when reinstalled.








With the pin in the drill, you'll need to flip the pin around to get the full contact area cleaned up. Then a liberal amount of grease like wheel bearing grease will keep the hinge moving smoothly and silently. Nobody likes a squeaky, creaking door.





Now we move on to the task of removing those worn-out brass bushings from our hinge.

Armed with a flat tipped punch and a light hammer, we'll need to reach through the bearing to push the other bushing out from behind.



An example of the punch is shown above. Nothing large is necessary. There is a possibility that the bushing has corroded to the inside of the hinge. If this is the case, a drill bit just larger than the inside diameter of your troublesome bushing will help persuade it to leave. A second, slightly larger bit may be needed if even more persuasion is necessary.

On the right we see the punch reaching through the hinge to tap out the other bushing from behind.


Farther right shows that bushing popping out just as easy as it should be but isn't always the case.



With the old bushings removed, we'll need to clean the inside of the hinge. We only need to clean the area where the new bushings will be inserted. A small piece of 320 grit sandpaper rolled up will do the trick. Insert in the hinge pin's hole and just twist and sand up and down for a bit. Just like cleaning the pin, it won't take too long to clean up this hole. If the sandpaper is longer than the pin, it's easier to sand the interior surface since you can move the sandpaper from both sides at once.







Our first step to reassembly, installing our new brass bushings. Set the bushing in the edge of the hole and gently tap it in with a light hammer. As you tap it in listen to the sound. When you reach the fully inserted position you will hear a more distinctive "Clink". Three light taps with this clink sound is all you'll need. That process repeats now for each of your remaining brass bushings.





Time to apply some grease to the top of both brass bushings and to the inside of the hinge housing where these bushings will be rubbing. Next, we will fit these two pieces back together being mindful of both taped sides showing. That tape is such a good reminder.





Lining up the holes so we can put the greased hinge pin back in place is next. It doesn't matter what angle you need to place the two halves together to line it up. Just be sure that both halves show the tape on the same side! **That** is what matters.



When you have the holes lined up fairly close, gently tap in the greased hinge pin with a light hammer. Above: once the knurled area of the pin has reached the edge of the hinge assembly, it's time for a couple short bursts with the air hammer. This will seat the hinge pin as you see on the **right photo**. Your hinge rebuild is now complete.



Just a quick tip on installation:

Fold your restored hinge to the point
where the arm is just holding over
those spring steel door clips. It will
be easier to manipulate the hinge
assembly into the hinge pocket in
this position.

One '64/5 glove box door, frame, hinge and replacement fascia. Door is good, just paint scratches. \$200.



### A cry for help

Our Central California Chapter was started in 2005 when a small group of 28 people met for the what would be the first gathering of the Central California Chapter of NCRS. Many steps had been taken to get to that point. Many more steps had to be accomplished to actually make this chapter a reality. In that small group, 6 individuals stepped up to volunteer to work for this new fledgling chapter. That was a very respectable 21% effort.

As Winston Churchill stated, "Those who fail to learn from history are condemned to repeat it." Communism, conceived as a system where all people would benefit equally from the fruits of collective labor, has repeatedly fallen short of its utopian promises. motivation, seeing that their extra labor vields no additional benefit, while less industrious individuals continue to receive the same rewards. This dynamic leads to a decline in overall productivity and innovation, undermining the verv foundation of communal prosperity. Ultimately, the lack of differentiation in recognition and reward erodes the drive for excellence, causing the system to stagnate and fail to deliver on its idealistic visions.

Is that a little too harsh? Maybe. But we can certainly see that we have enough members to help make this chapter the envy of many. Collectively, we have a lot of talent. Much of it is still untapped and as such our chapter languishes with the few doing so much for so many.


